Title: Human Resilience, Life Adversity, and Adaptation to Life Course Transitions from Early Adulthood to Late Middle Adulthood

Mid-life is an important developmental stage that consists of multiple critical life transitions such as transition from education to work (early adulthood), to marriage/parenthood, (middle adulthood) and to pre-retirement (late-middle adulthood). However, mid-life is usually less studied in comparison to other developmental stages. This interdisciplinary project is the first local research that examines how resilience facilitates adaptation to critical life transitions in the face of adverse childhood experiences and life adversity from early to late middle adulthood.

The interdisciplinary team of researchers in this project has formulated the Integrated Dynamic Psycho-Socio-Ecological Life Course (IDSEL) model of resilience and adaptation to guide the project. The IDSEL model views resilience as a process that changes over a person's life course because of multiple developmental processes. Resilience is also influenced by individual, family, organization, community, and social/cultural factors. This project consists of three tiers of investigations. Tier 1 investigations include a 2-wave panel study with three age cohorts: Early (aged 21-26), middle (aged 30-50), and late middle adulthood (aged 55-65). Multilevel factors associated with individual resilience, adverse childhood experiences, current and chronic stress, life adversity, timing of significant life events as well as well-being outcomes will be measured at two time points to capture how resilience facilitates adaptation to critical life transitions. Tier 2 investigations include four level studies to examine phenomenon that cannot be easily captured by the panel study. These level studies aim to identify biophysiological markers of resilience, explore whether resilience can be transmitted between parents and their children, determine the protective role of resilience in balancing the competing demands of work and family, and examine the relationship between citizen participation and resilience building. Tier 3 investigations will involve the analysis of big public data set such as Gallup, World Values Survey, economic indicators, and environmental data to identify national/community level resilient trajectories before and after collective adversities such as natural disasters and the COVID-19 pandemic.

Evidence derived from the three tiers of investigations will be synergized and analyzed to fill such knowledge gaps as how factors in different levels interact with each other to influence resilience and adaptation. This project will benefit researchers, professionals (e.g., social workers, teachers, counselors, economists), and policy makers.

The pandemic has generated a 'New Normal' in which a significant portion of our physical encounters has been replaced by online alternatives. Pre-pandemic research has shown that older adults often fall behind their younger counterparts with respect to the use of ICT. This study attempts to fill knowledge gaps which will be essential for developing a responsive, age-enabling ICT environment: (1) to review what constitutes informative 'common denominators' to map the differences in ICT access, literacy and usage between younger and older populations that may disadvantage the latter, especially after the emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic, (2) to devise a socio-culturally valid user typology for older ICT users will be needed for segmenting and diversifying support for digital inclusion, and (3) devise multi-level policies and services will be needed to support diverse older ICT users and nurture an age-friendly ICT environment.

Guided by a person-in-environment perspective, this project will involve six studies with three phases. Phase 1 will be an instrument development phase. Study 1 will be a focus group study with 144 adults aged 55 or above to examine the socio-culturally meaningful indicators of digital divide, dimensions for typologizing older ICT users as well as their ethical concerns over ICT. The results will inform Study 2, a pilot telephone survey with a representative sample of 900 younger and older adults, to develop quantitative instruments for measuring the digital divide, user typology and ethical concerns. Professionals will be consulted in Study 3 for refining the new instruments via a focus group study. Phase 2, a formal evaluation phase, will involve Study 4. With the help of spatial modelling, a large-scale, face-to-face survey with 1620 middle-aged and older adults will be conducted to examine the associations between ICT access, literacy and usage with biopsychosocial outcomes and the socio-spatial characteristics of the participants' neighborhoods. Study 5 will be a comparative study for evaluating state- and community-level policies and interventions for fostering ICT usage in older adults in technologically-developed societies. The findings of Studies 1 to 5 will feed into a series of workshops and a Delphi study in Study 6 (Phase 3: solution generation phase) for generating service and policy directions and suggestions.

This project will refresh the society's understanding of diversity in older adults' ICT usage and provide a robust empirical basis for the development of responsive, empowering and age-inclusive ICT policies and support. It will also serve as an excellent example for international scholars, policy-makers and care professionals to periodically review their understanding of ICT usage in the growing population of older adults.



The global trends of population ageing and rising life expectancy have increased demands for active ageing and age-friendliness. Creating age-friendly environment require comprehensive knowledge of topics related to ageing, and especially those related to university students entering professions that require working with or for older adults. To promote active ageing, it is crucial for older adults to be able to manage and expand their social network and engagement. However, students typically have limited knowledge of ageing and hold stereotypes about older adults because of their limited exposure to age-related topics in the classroom and the lack of opportunities to interact with older adults. With the outbreak of the Covid-19 pandemic, older adults are at a higher risk of experiencing a shrinking of social network and lacking social participation. Dr. Bai will discuss a free project which has used innovative, intergenerational approaches to promote active ageing and age-friendliness in the digital world. In these projects, with reference to the intergroup contact theory and theory of learning, Dr. Bai's team has prepared and evaluated an informal active ageing education (IAAE) model to help students develop an age-friendly mindset and the ability and to empower older individuals through intergenerational digital learning.

Dr. Xue Bai is an Associate Professor at the Department of Applied Social Sciences in the City University of Hong Kong. She is currently working on the topic of ageing and intergenerational relationships. Dr. Bai is an expert in ageing research with the areas of geriatric medicine, gerontology, social policy and social care for older adults, and evidence-based practice. She has published numerous articles in international journals and has been invited to present at international conferences. Currently, she is an appointed member of the Interdisciplinary Commission on Enhancing the Digital Inclusion of Older Adults and the Interdisciplinary Commission on Enhancing the Digital Inclusion of Older Adults.

Lay health workers, despite their lack of formal training, are important partners in providing accessible care to people with risk to develop diabetes in the community. While pre-diabetes and diabetes are more prevalent among people with low socio-economic status, including those living in inadequate houses. However, this population often have accessibility problems to formal care services due to their financial and social disadvantages. In a high-income, developed Chinese society, this pragmatic randomized controlled trial seeks to investigate the effect of a 6-months lay health worker intervention in diabetes management among people living in sub-divided flats units in Hong Kong. Our trial is one of the first to investigate the effect of lay health worker intervention on pre-diabetes management in a low-income Chinese population residing in inadequate houses. This study could provide insight to consider alternative service provision models to people living with diabetes risk in the community.

Dr. Crystal Ying Chan is a public health researcher with research interests in poverty and health, family caregiving burden and health, and mental health and evaluation of interventions. She earned her doctoral degree and bachelor's degree in Public Health at the Chinese University of Hong Kong. Her previous research experience included various commissioned projects supported by the Shau Shui Pau District Council (HK), the Jockey Club Charities Trust (HK), and the Wellcome Trust (UK).

The COVID-19 pandemic disrupts normal face-to-face social work services in Hong Kong but it creates new opportunities for social work services go digital. Marketers debate over the desirability of an influencer's endorsement frequency, or the proportion of sponsored posts to the total posts of an influencer. We propose that an influencer's endorsement frequency will be seen as a negative cue that infers manipulative intent. Meanwhile, endorsement frequency also operates as a positive cue that infers perceived recognition, indicating the extent to which an influencer is acknowledged and validated by the market of brands. Taken together, we predict that as an influencer's endorsement frequency increases, consumers' engagement with the influencer's sponsored post will decrease due to higher manipulative intent. However, when endorsement frequency is very high, the recognition benefit can dominate to increase post engagement. Moreover, the influencer's consistent brand endorsement and organic product mention weaken the effect of endorsement frequency. We conducted two online experiments and leveraged two secondary datasets to test the proposed framework.

In this presentation, I will introduce Robot for Autism Behavioral Intervention (RABI), a newly developed robot-based intervention, and summarize its effectiveness in enhancing social and behavioral skills in individuals with autism spectrum disorder (ASD). Since 2015, RABI has provided training in a plethora of social and behavioral skills ranging from self-care and conversation, and educational skills. Through deploying social robots, the RABI curriculum reduces autism severity and increases social and behavioral functioning. RABI was developed from the application of theories pertaining to the special learning needs of individuals with autism. Local and Macau non-government organizations and mainstream/special schools have adopted RABI to benefit their students. Their feedback includes significant improvements in students' verbal and non-verbal communication and "generalization of acquired skills to students' daily lives". The government has also identified RABI as an innovative and successful intervention for autism. RABI is currently expanding its business and will be applied internationally.

Prof. Catherine So received her PhD in Psychology at the University of Chicago in 2007. Then she took up the Assistant Professor Position at the National University of Singapore in 2007 and returned to Hong Kong in 2012. She is currently a Full Professor in the Department of Educational Psychology at the Chinese University of Hong Kong. Her research interests lie in language and cognitive development of typically and atypically developing children and intervention for autistic children. She has published over 50 journal articles and received local and international research and service awards.

Established in 1990, cross-art danbi (雜戲) has successfully revitalized not only the cross-art but also other traditional performing arts in its young fans. The rise of danbi is coupled with surging cultural nationalism as well as vigorous support from its young fans. The paper studies the emerging cultural masculinities created by the leading young creators of the allegedly "largest male idol group in Mainland China". The public appearance of these young creators in various popular contexts is widely considered Danbi's key to social popularity. The paper foregrounds the young members' active participation across different popular industries and tactics in marketing cultural nationalism. Reality shows and commercials featuring these young male idols, their social media activities, fanzine activities and their engagement with the trend of Danbi-Chin will be analyzed. The paper argues that danbi, driven heavily on promoting revamped Chinese masculinities in popular media. The young male creators could also be seen negotiating a space between the convergence of Confucian-oriented male gender role idealized by the cross-art industry, and the danbi aesthetic. This passionately embraced and a queer culture of its young fans. The convergence, implemented in Danbi's performance, image building and social interaction, enables tremendous success in attention-economy as well as the popularization of traditional performing arts.

Dr. Meng Li is currently a Teaching Fellow at the Confucius Institute of Hong Kong (CIHK), The Hong Kong Polytechnic University. Li holds a PhD in Gender and Cultural Studies in The University of Sydney, Australia (2013). In this seminar, Dr. Yuen will share the findings of a recently completed study on the higher education aspirations of 4800 senior secondary students from mainstream secondary schools in Hong Kong. Special attention will be drawn to the perceived barriers and the value of higher education for South Asian ethnic minority students. The survey findings concluded that ethnic minority students rated glass ceiling effects (barriers) associated with family background, ethnic culture and language, financial situation, and societal expectations on gender as higher than their local mainstream and Chinese immigrant counterparts. At the other extreme, they value higher education as a critical arena to alleviate their underprivileged conditions, improving their future living condition, socio-economic status, self-esteem, and horizons. Policy implications to level the playing field to increase their aspiration for university will be discussed with reference to the empirical data.

Dr. Celeste Yuet-Mai Yuen is an Associate Professor at the Faculty of Education and Co-Director of the Hong Kong Centre for the Development of Educational Leadership at the Chinese University of Hong Kong. Celeste is also the President elect of the Hong Kong Educational Research Association (HKERA). She received her doctorate from York University in Toronto, U.K. Currently, Celeste focuses on intercultural education, effective school leadership and policy studies. Her research areas include Chinese immigrant and ethnic minority education, policy studies, intercultural studies, life satisfaction, cross-cultural studies, and Chinese popular culture and women's history.

We received 17 applications from undergraduate and graduate students in different departments. Four applicants were shortlisted. Topic: AI-Enhanced Augmentative & Alternative Communication Applications for Cantonese Speakers in Hong Kong

Abstract

This study aims to develop an AI-enhanced Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) tablet application for Cantonese-speaking individuals with complex communication needs (CCN) in Hong Kong. The proposed application seeks to improve communication efficiency and user satisfaction through AI-driven features such as predictive text suggestions, AI-assisted customization of AAC symbols, and Language Activity Monitoring. The development process comprises needs assessment, prototype development, user testing, data analysis, and iterative feedback from individuals with CCN, their families, educators, and therapists. By analyzing both quantitative and qualitative data, the study intends to identify areas for improvement and guide app enhancements. Ethical considerations, including informed consent, data confidentiality, user autonomy, and addressing potential biases in AI systems, are prioritized throughout the research process. The AI-enhanced AAC application has the potential to significantly improve communication outcomes and overall quality of life for Cantonese-speaking individuals with CCN in Hong Kong. Future research should explore the effectiveness of AI-enhanced AAC applications in other languages and contexts, investigate the long-term impact of AI technology on communication outcomes for individuals with CCN, and examine the integration of additional AI-driven features, such as emotion recognition and context-aware support, to further enhance the usability and effectiveness of AAC systems. By leveraging AI technology and involving users and experts in the design process, this study aims to create a user-friendly and personalized AAC solution that meets the unique needs of its target audience, empowering them to communicate more effectively in their daily lives.



Topic: 數位人文視域下「蘭」古典詩詞命名實體識別研究

Abstract


「蘭」古典詩詞的命名實體識別有助於深度挖掘蘭詩詞文本之間的關聯，對傳承中國悠久的蘭文化有著重要意義。同時也為其他花卉詩詞的文本深度挖掘提供了思路。文章將通過線上數據庫、論文、書籍等方式進行蘭古典詩詞數據的採集，重點選擇詩詞中涉及的蘭的別名、顏色、人名、地點、時間（早晚）、節日、季節7類命名實體進行標注和識別，得到BERT、RoBERTa、GuwenBERT、SikuBERT和SikuRoBERT模型不同識別結果，並與CRF模型識別結果別對，試圖從實驗結果判斷哪種模型的表現最優異，其調和平均數達到的數值是多少，以此說明該模型最適合用「蘭」古詩詞文本的深層次挖掘研究，並可向更多的花卉詩詞擴展，古詩詞文本的實體標注體系將可以為後續研究提供借鑒。


